

When you worry and question yourself as to whether or not you measure up, you immediately set up self-destructing roadblocks to a positive self-esteem and unhappiness.

Let's define Jealousy. Jealousy is a combination of fear and anger: fear of losing something and anger that someone is moving in on something that you feel belongs only to you.

Many people feel jealous from time to time? To make life easier, we develop repeated behavior, or habits. Many habits are positive and productive, but others are destructive and get out of control. Jealousy is one of those behaviors. When a behavior that we think satisfies our needs turns into a habit which we don't know how to control or stop, we have become an addict. In our Female Auxiliaries, we have become addicted to being jealous of one another.

How Do Problems with Jealousy in our Organizations Come About?

Problems with Jealousy come about when members hold back their true feelings or when they fail to realize the importance of open communication. We often get caught up in on our personal feelings and agendas. Usually members who are disgruntled are unsatisfied with decisions, or are impatient with the growth of the organization. They will usually gossip, misrepresent the truth and disrespect the leadership.

How Do I handle Jealous Members within our Organizations?

As Sisters and Brothers in Christ, we first have to make sure that we are in the right frame of mind and have the right attitude to even discuss a situation with a jealous member. We then must identify the problem by asking ourselves, "What is making this member Jealous?" or "Why does this member feel anger or threatened?" Once we have an understanding of why a member is feeling jealous, we can begin to take positive steps toward developing creative solutions without the negative emotions that accompanies jealousy. Members will feel protected when they have structure and mutual respect. Effective communication helps bring this about especially when leaders share their vision. We must make every effort to ensure that your message is received and understood and to provide the members with a way to submit feedback. Effective communication is a dialog.

My Responsibility as a Member



1. Anecdote: Humility (Patricia A. Stafford)


I once read that to become truly great, one has to stand with people, not above them.

We must realize that our mission in life should be to serve rather than to be served. Once we learn how to follow, we will learn how to lead. No one has the right answer 100% of the time and often you will have to eat humble pie, but that does not diminish who you are and whose you are.

What makes humility so desirable is the marvelous thing it does to us; it creates in us a capacity for the closest possible intimacy with God.

2. Disrespect: Not showing respect or honor to which it is due.



Disrespect is the primary root of disobedience. Looking through Scripture, Adam and Eve sinned because they did not respect God's command. Cain killed Abel because he did not respect his brother's life. Lying, stealing, vandalism, strife and disobedience stem from an attitude of disrespect toward someone or something.

Anecdote: Respect for those in authority (Patricia A. Stafford)

Respect has great importance in everyday life. As children we are taught to respect our parents, teachers, and elders, school rules and traffic laws, family and cultural traditions, other people's feelings and rights, our country's flag and leaders, the truth and people's differing opinions. And we come to value respect for such things. We may also learn that how our lives go depend every bit as much on whether we respect ourselves. The value of self-respect may be something we can take for granted, or we may discover how very important it is when our self-respect is threatened, or we lose it and have to work to regain it, or we have to struggle to develop or maintain it in a hostile environment. Some people find that finally being able to respect them is what matters most.

No leader is going to be liked by all the people all the time. But you should always respect the position whether or not you like the leader.

3. Holding grudges/ Un-Forgiveness-

Definitions: Un-forgiveness-not willing to forgive Grudge: resentment for act or deed

Everyone gets hurt or disappointed at some point. Some people are able to shake things off and move on. Others hold on to resentment for years. One reason that holding grudges is a bad idea is that cutting off all communication with an individual causes them to be unable to seek forgiveness from you.

When you are holding a grudge, the hate that you are experiencing simmers inside of you and can suck the joy out of your life. It's quite hard to be happy when all that is on your mind is the wrong that someone has done to you, and the baggage that a grudge creates can hold you down for years.

Anecdote: Forgive and "Let it Go" (Patricia A. Stafford)

Life is too short to hold grudges. Besides they get in the way of perfect happiness. Let go of things you cannot change and apologize when the situation calls for one. Love deeply and forgive quickly. Give everything and have no regrets. Life is not always fair so you have to take the bad with the good, and move on. Always forgive. 
"Threats to the Bond of Unity of Sisterhood" Poor Communication, Gossip, Unresolved Conflicts and Sanctioned Incompetence

We don't get to choose our family, but we can choose our friends, some say we Masonic sisters are the siblings God forgot to give us. Sisterhood is real and like other relationships it requires hard work to achieve. Our lifelong journey of Sisterhood uses guide posts of trust, respect, honesty, appreciation and love. It's a warm smile felt through a phone call in your moments of despair; a reassuring hug when you feel the weight of the world on your shoulders. It's knowing that there will always be someone there for you. It's all that a good and lasting friendship is, only better and is treasured. It means always being able to count on others and prove you too can be counted on.

From the outside looking in, it is difficult to explain the unbreakable bonds of Sisterhood we share and once you are inside it is easier understood how the Female Masonic organizations in our jurisdiction reflects the rewards of earning respect from others by first respecting yourself. We give without any expectations of receiving in return. It is more than wearing extravagant regalia, displaying sacred emblems or reciting ritualistic phrases. Sisterhood is our daily way of life and it won't solve all your problems. Trust is the foundation of our organization and once established it maintains integrity. Among other things, this means keeping promises or oaths and always being truthful, regardless of how difficult it might be.

There are many others, but these four (4) things threaten the very fabric of our foundation of Sisterhood which is woven by "UNITY":

1. Poor communication: Often there may be times when the right hand doesn't seem to know what the left hand is doing; it may cause members to become detached and insecure. A guaranteed way to lose trust from our members is to act and speak inconsistently. Nothing confuses people faster than inconsistency and if the confusion is due to contradiction, trust is sure to fall victim. Withholding information or allowing the communication channels to shut down - both top-down and bottom-up allow rumors to start and the misinformation is believed to be real. An unwillingness to consider other ideas and points of view, and/or to

create an atmosphere of "It's my way or the highway" will certainly cut-off communication and eventually shatter trust.

- 2. Good communications breeds trust, so when members feel everyone is informed, they pull together to accomplish a shared vision. This is the essence of trust that elevates "Sisterhood" in our organizations.
- 3. **Gossip** is discussing *anything* with a person or persons who can't solve the problem. It is very degrading and destructive. It is good to allow members to express themselves, but it should be with someone who can do something about it.
- 4. Unresolved disagreements undermine peace and harmony. This will destroy *UNITY*. Most times this is the result of a leader avoiding confrontation; or they are in denial. Either way, everyone loses as the camaraderie unravels. When several people are working together, it is inevitable to experience locked horns from time to time. In our organization, our leaders are trained to react quickly and decisively, immediately pulling the splinter out, disinfecting the wound, and allowing time to heal with only a faint scar as a reminder.
- 5. Sanctioned incompetence: Enabling the continuance of a destructive attitude demoralizes others when no one addresses it. When this occurs, they see a leader who will not take action after realizing this person either cannot, or will not do their job. This will leave the other members de-motivated, especially when one is only out for herself, and in our Sisterhood environment, they quickly lose the respect and trust of others.

Before you make the final decision to join our organizations, please ask yourself the questions posed in this poem because our standards are high, our expectations are unwavering but our rewards are commendable and prestigious:

Will You "Just" Belong?

Will you be an active member, the kind that would be missed....Or will you become contented that your name is on the list? Will you attend the meetings and mingle with the flockOr will you stay at home and criticize and knock? Are you willing to ever go and visit a member that is sickOr leave the work to just a few and talk about the clique? There's quite a program scheduled that I'm sure you've heard about; and we need you to join us and help with hand and heart Don't become just a member, promise to dig in and do your part ... so think this over member, you know right from wrong. Are you committed to being an active member, or do you just want to belong? - Unknown

Essentials for Positive Sister to Sister Relationships JacQué Strappy, G.M.A.M

A. The M Factor (Positive <u>Mentors</u>, <u>Morals</u>, & <u>Maturity-Spiritual</u>)

Mentors

Empowered sisters seek good and godly counsel and in doing such set a platform for positive and productive relationships. It is essential to seek and accept mentoring from other women. We must first understand what mentoring is and is not. Mentoring is:

- 1. Assisting not fixing
- 2. Guiding not telling
- 3. Walking alongside not lording over
- 4. Looking forward not back
- 5. Learning to depend on God through someone else
- 6. Capitalizing on our God given strengths, not focusing on our weaknesses

The Godly woman or woman of integrity that you choose as a mentor must have a genuine heart for both mentoring and you. One way to recognize her will be her willingness to sacrifice time and energy and commit to do it for the long haul and not give up on you or your situation easily. You will know her true character by her integrity and ability to keep the content of your time confidentially. These attributes will be exemplified by her wisdom and patience visibly expressed through her spiritual and emotional maturity.

A Godly mentor will not be afraid to teach from her mistakes as well as successes. She will help you see God at work in your life and help you move beyond the past and grow in a healthy way.

Morals: (Ethical) behavior

To be 'ethical' you must consider seizing every opportunity and see the potential to do good everywhere. Ethical behavior is characterized by honesty, fairness and equity in interpersonal and professional relationships. Ethical behavior respects the dignity, diversity and rights of individuals and never takes advantage of a situation

An ethical person lives by standards. Namely, you would obey the laws and further than that you would be honest and upright in all your dealings.

Ethics comes from the Greek word *ethos* - moral character or custom. **Morality** comes from the Latin word *moralis* - custom or manner. The words both deal with the customs or the manner in which people do things.

Their modern meanings relate to the way people act - either good or bad.

We stand firm on the capability of our members to represent themselves with good moral character at all times. Masonry has always been noted to be a gentlemen's organization of fraternal brothers, with a mantra to make good men better men; a fraternal brotherhood that supports and respects each other. Therefore in no wise shall less be expected of the ladies of our Sisterhood.

Maturity (Spiritual)



The Masonic Family is not a Church but it is based on Heroes' and Heroines from the sacred text and Biblical principles. We could not leave out the necessity for Spiritual Maturity the foundation on which true brotherhood and sisterhood is built. Spiritual maturity is not a matter of age, appearance or achievement. Spiritual maturity is a matter of CHARACTER.

Character makes a difference. It's character that counts. D. L. Moody said, "Character is what you are in the dark." Recognition is what people say about you. Character is what God knows about you. God says it's your character that determines who you are. Here are five marks of what it means to grow to spiritual maturity.

1. A spiritual mature person is positive under PRESSURE.

"My brethren, count it all joy when you fall into various trials, knowing that the testing of your faith produces patience. But let patience have its perfect work, that you may be perfect and complete, lacking nothing." James 1:2-4 (NKJV)

All of us have problems in this life – all of us have trials – all of us have situations that are not good. How do you handle them? Do you act positive under pressure? Remember the Bible says: "Count it all joy when you fall into various trials."

Life is full of problems and a big part of life is – problem solving. The question to ask is, "Do I have the right attitude as I approach the problems of life?" Remember the Bible tells you to, "Count it all joy when you fall into various trials."

2. A spiritual mature person is sensitive to the needs of other PEOPLE.

"Whoever has the world's goods, and sees his brother in need and closes his heart against him, how does the love of God abide in him?"

1 John 3:17
(NASV)

A spiritually mature person is sensitive to the needs of those who are around them. A spiritually mature person doesn't just look out for their own needs – they are also aware of the needs of others. They understand that there are many around them that are hurting and have needs. They realized that they are blessed to be a blessing to others.

God tells us that spiritual maturity is about love and being concerned about other people. This is a sign of spiritual maturity. Don't show favoritism, don't be a snob, don't be rude, don't look down on other people, don't judge by appearances, don't insult people, and don't exploit people. You see the second test of spirituality maturity is how I treat other people.

3. A spiritual mature person is a PEACEMAKER not a troublemaker.

"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons of God." Matthew 5:9 (NASV)

The questions to ask are: 'Am I a peacemaker or am I a troublemaker? Do I like to argue? Do I like to debate? Do I like to stir the pot? Do I hurt other people's feelings? Am I a peacemaker or am I a troublemaker?' The mark of a spiritually mature person is the lack of conflict in their life.

4. A spiritual mature person is PATIENT.

"Be patient, therefore, brothers, until the coming of the Lord. See how the farmer waits for the precious fruit of the earth, being patient about it, until it receives the early and the late rains. You also, be patient. Establish your hearts, for the coming of the Lord is at hand." James 5:7-8 (ESV)

Patience is another mark of spiritual maturity. The word 'patient' is used three times in these two verses – that tells me that being patient is important. Being patient is a quality of character.

Many times God says, "Not yet." That does not mean no – it means - not yet. We need to wait. We need to be patient. Look at what the Psalmist tells us in Psalm twenty seven:

"Wait for the LORD; Be strong and let your heart take courage; Yes, wait for the LORD." Psalm 27:14 (NASV)

5. A spiritual mature person is PRAYERFUL.

"Pray without ceasing." I Thessalonians 5:17 (NASV)

When things are going good – pray. When things are going bad – pray. In all things - pray.

"The prayer of a person living right with God is something powerful to be reckoned with." James 5:16 (MSG)

Prayer is talking to God. It is bringing Him your requests. It is praising Him. It is petitioning Him. When we pray we acknowledge that He has control in our lives.

You see those who are spiritually mature – understand the power of God. There are things in your life right now that you think – no one can fix. Guess what – God can. How do you handle your problems? Are you positive under pressure? Are you sensitive to the needs of others around you? Are you a peacemaker rather than a troublemaker? Are you patient and are you prayerful? These are all marks of a spiritually mature Christian – commit yourself today – to growth as a Christian.


